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Similarities of Muslim and Christian Faiths by Noor Hamdan

So many times, people are left with the belief that the differences in the two faiths of Muslim and Christian far outweigh the similarities; however, on December 4th, Imam of the mosque presented to the school the facts that unite the two faiths; "Cousins" as he called them.

How are we cousins, you might ask? Simple, the lineage of the prophet Muhammad is that of Ishmael the son of Abraham. Jesus' lineage is from Isaac, the other son of Abraham and the brother to Ishmael, making the two faiths cousins.

The relationship of the cousins gets even greater in similarities when one takes a look at the beliefs and practices common in said faiths. Each faith is built on basic moral obligations. While the Christian faith does not have a set of pillars, the faith has requirements much like the five pillars of the Muslim faith: declaring your faith to your God (Allah), prayer (the Muslim faith calls for prayer five times daily), fasting which is similar to lent in the Christian faith, charity, which both faiths require a 2.5% tithe, and finally a pilgrimage to Makkah. While the Christian faith does not require the pilgrimage, many of that faith believe it to be a necessity in firmly cementing their faith before God.

Another commonality shared by the cousin faiths is each faith believes in peace and love. While war may, at times, be inevitable to which both have stood side by side from the Revolutionary War to the war now waged in the Middle East, neither faith believes in harming or killing, and both believe Allah (God) will condemn those that harm or kill in "his name."

The purpose of the media is to wisely and carefully open the eyes of society, Muslims and Christians stand

side by side to protect our nation and our world.

While it is easy to get caught up in the propaganda the media writes, not all of it is fact. It can be so slanted that it taints a sector of society. We are united in peace and in war, for we are cousins.

America the Beautiful



Trips such as these provide fun as well as bonding time that will forge lifelong friendships.


Gobbly Goodness

7th Grade: Mohamad Hamdan 8th Grade-Mostakim Sifat






Picnic Packs a Punch




Here students are able to comfortably access the web to do research for their classes as well as play educational games to enhance their learning.
